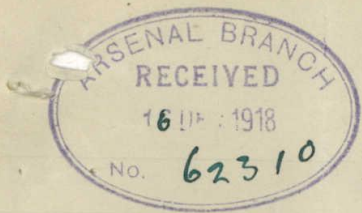

I had an interview with you on Jan 4<sup>th</sup> of this year, re the repatriation of myself, wife, & child, to which you promised to give immediate attention. I might mention that about a month ago, I received notice from the Ministry of Labor, Queen Anne's Chamber's, saying they had approved of my application, & forwarded the same to Cust. House. I have been in England 3 yrs & 8 mths, having come to London at my own expense, & then, when the Cust. Munitions scheme came into operation, joined over here. This accounts for my high badge number. (4407) which seems to place me at a disadvantage, unfairly I think, with those men having a lower badge number, - & also a much lower period of residence in England, on munition work. Hoping you will arrange to get me away very soon.
